

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Land Stewardship Centre's Watershed Stewardship Grant

• \$12,000 helped us purchase promotional items for LILSA + boost online engagement.

• We also purchased a large number of native plants to be distributed to lake residents at an Alberta Beach Farmers' Market to restore riparian areas on lake properties.

• We will continue to develop educational materials on best practices for lake quality.



FLOWERING RUSH UPDATE










Protection Areas – these will be given continued attention in 2022 to ensure that Flowering Rush does not establish through hand removal methods under the supervision of the Alberta Community Partnership group. Through hand digging, areas will involve little disturbance of the wildlife habitat. Approach will require workers and boats for access and removal.

Area A is the thick portions of Flowering Rush in the southwest targeted by large-scale herbicide applications in 2021. This area will undergo touch up applications on stands that should have improved access with imazapyr opening up stands for better application access to all areas of the infestation.

Area B is the sporadic portions of Flowering Rush in the northeast and will be tackled in 2022 with Habitat Aqua applications. Careful tracking will be required to ensure only one application per area, since dealing with interrupted stands of flowering rush. Application will have to occur in a systematic way to ensure one application and any re visitation of areas are done so that visual injury clearly is evident for same year touch ups.

Herbicide applications will be completed by a contracted certified aquatic vegetation applicator, with significant experience, under management by Alberta Environment & Parks. Habitat Aqua (imazapyr) application will be targeted to occur in August 2022. Applications may occur from water and/or from shoreline to ensure sufficient coverage of flowering rush stands.

- High reproduction rate + establishes easily Displaces native vegetation
- Draws pollinators away from native plants

Wastewater




• LILSA will work with the Darwell Wastewater Commission to educate residents of Lake Isle on the merits of a waste water system.

• The waste water system will be for all residents on the north and south sides of the lake.


LSA Weir




ELECTION OF 3 DIRECTORS 4-YEAR TERM
